EASY RIBBED SCARF

Description

A simple but striking scarf that's great for both men and women. Works up quickly and makes a great gift or a great donation to charity.

Finished size is 5 in. wide by 82 in. long with fringe.

Materials Hook

Yarn

• I (5.5mm) crochet hook or size needed to get gauge

Notions

- 7 oz. worsted weight yarn (Sample is made in Red Heart Soft)
- Scissors
- Tapestry needle

Gauge

- 15 dc and 8.5 rows = 4 in.
- Gauge is not critical to this project

Abbreviations

abbrev. Abbreviation meaning.

blo back loop only

ch chain

dbc double base chain

dc double crochet

yo yarn over

* * repeat instructions between asterisks as many times as indicated

Pattern Notes

• This pattern uses a double base chain for the foundation. If you are uncomfortable with this stitch, you can simply chain 252 and dc in the 3rd chain from hook and each chain across

Special Stitches

• **Double Base Chain**: Ch 2, yo, insert hook in first ch, * yo, pull up loop, yo, pull through one loop (foundation chain made), (yo, pull through 2 loops) twice (double crochet made). Double base chain started. Yo, insert hook into foundation chain and repeat from * for number of stitches called for.

Scarf

Row 1 (RS): Dbc 250. Turn.

Row 2 Ch 2 (counts as dc here and throughout), dc in blo of each dc across. Turn.

Rows 3-10: Repeat Row 2.

Finishing

Fasten off and weave in ends.

Fringe: Cut 60 pieces of yarn to 10 in. long. Using 3 strands in the end of each row, tie fringe on. Trim to even up if desired or needed.
